After so many years in London, you're now a veteran. But is there any place that held a certain magic when you first arrived?

Yes, in fact in there are two. On my very first visit to London I stayed in <u>Highgate</u> <u>Village</u> near Hampstead Heath where I now live. I found it utterly charming that London has so many small village communities. London is really green despite being urban. Also the charm of the small coffee and tea shops left an impression with me that I shall never forget. On a clear day you can overlook all of London from <u>Waterlow</u> <u>Park</u> just next to <u>Highgate Cemetery</u> where Carl Max is buried – it's worth a walk and a guided tour.

The East End was very different then from now – however it still has that certain energy you can only find in London. <u>Market Brick Lane</u> and <u>Columbia Road Flower</u> will always be one my favourite destinations London.

In Cheshire Street you can find shops like Labour & Wait (www.labourandwait.co.uk), MARMARCo (www.marmarco.com) Dragana Perisic (www.draganaperisic.com). Also you can buy everything from plants, clothing food to amazing furniture. In fact you become rather glocal in London - globalised and yet so local.

Well, <u>Selfridges</u> is my absolute favourite comfort place as they just have everything your heart could ever desire. The other premium is their car park, which means you do a massive shopping spree and then put it all in the boot of your car rather than carry it around with you. However more recently I have discovered <u>Upper Street in Islington</u> and it has become my favourite shopping destination and it's nearby as it only takes 10 minutes by car or 20 minutes by bus from where I live.
